




**2009**


Forbes knocks it out the park. Faith in capitalism is essential for everyone. The book will help you keep the faith.

**2012**


An incredible book about the growth of technology solving tomorrow's problems.

**2006**


A father and son, trying to do the right thing after the holocaust. Disturbing and, yet, hopeful. No matter what happens, the good guys can keep the fire burning.

**2009**


My favorite historian tackles one of my favorite politicians. A must read for anyone interested in the history of the 20th century.

**2009**






## ***Fall Of Giants***


While not a book on economics or politics, this historical fiction novel is a fascinating read and a great way to learn the history of World War I and the Bolshevik Revolution.


***The Forgotten Man***

The best book on the Great Depression. Written for the lay person. Very interesting.




***The Panic of 1907***

A readable look at one of the most famous panics of all.




***The Ascent of Money***

A wide-ranging book by one of the rising stars of the economic profession.




***Outliers***

General interest, fascinating and interesting.




***Rethinking the Great Depression***

A detailed history of what went wrong with policy in the 1930s.




***The Road to Serfdom***

Hayek won the Nobel Prize for this analysis. You will wonder how he could have described today so well back in 1944.




***Coach: Lessons on the Game of Life***

Short, very well-written real-life story about our education system. Anyone 40 or over will love it.




***Wealth and Poverty***

The bible of the Reagan revolution.




***Free to Choose***

A classic. Must read for anyone serious about economics.




***Atlas Shrugged***

One of the best selling novels of all time. This book will also be terrifyingly prescient to anyone paying attention to politics these




***Economics in One Lesson***

If you ever wondered what economics is about, this book will help.




***Human Action***

The best book, hands down, on economics. But strap in, because it's a tough read.




***The Way the World Works***
