MARCH HOUSING STARTS

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- Housing starts dropped 11.9% in March to 947,000 units at an annual rate. The consensus had expected a smaller decline to a 1.01 million rate. Starts are down 36.5% versus a year ago and off 58.7% from the peak in January 2006.
- Single-family starts fell 5.7% in March and are down 43.6% versus last year. Multiple-unit starts dropped 24.6% but are only down 6.6% versus last year.
- Starts fell in every major region of the country.
- New building permits declined 5.8% in March to 927,000 units at an annual rate, which was below consensus expectations. Single-family permits are down 46.4% versus last year and 66.3% since the peak in September 2005.

Implications: We see the steep drop in home building in March as a glass half-full, not half-empty. Single-family housing starts are at the second lowest monthly level since 1982. But this is what has to happen in order for home builders to work off their excess inventories, and then start to recover. The correction in inventories is underway and the precipitous decline in home building in March makes it more likely that building will hit bottom in 2008, rather than 2009.
