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MAY HOUSING STARTS

- Housing starts declined 3.3% in May to 975,000 units at an annual rate. The consensus had expected a 980,000 rate. Starts are down 32.1% versus a year ago and off 57.1% from the peak in January 2006.
- Single-family starts fell 1.0% in May and are down 41.2% versus last year. Multiple-unit starts fell 8.0% in May after a spike of 18.1% in April.
- Starts increased in the Northeast but declined in every other major region.
- New building permits declined 1.3% in May to 969,000 units at an annual rate, but came in slightly above consensus expectations. Single-family permits declined 4.0% in May, are down 41.4% versus last year and 65.4% since the peak in September 2005.

Implications: Home building continues to decline but is probably getting very close to a bottom. The number of homes under construction is down 27.8% versus last year, the largest 12-month decline since 1980. Given this decline and the drop the year before, the level of housing construction is low enough that the industry can work off excess inventories – a necessary step toward a sustainable recovery. With housing starts near a bottom on a nationwide basis, there are many communities across the country where home building is already rebounding. That said, we continue to expect home prices to drop on a nationwide average basis through mid-2009, as the market continues to work off excess inventories.
